A prosperous future can only be built on solid foundations – which is why, in Staffordshire, we believe that helping people of all ages to grow and flourish through good education is so important.

Here, from chart-topping university courses to state-of-the-art academies and everything in between, you'll find a real commitment to offering a bright start for young minds and dedicated qualifications for lifelong learners.

In Staffordshire we're proud to be home to 2 respected universities with 29,350 undergraduate and postgraduate students, 4 Further Education (FE) colleges, and over 400 schools, including 11 independent schools.

Ranked Britain's best university in the 2022 Student Crowd University Awards, Keele University's 600 acre leafy campus in Newcastle-under-Lyme offers over 211 undergraduate and c. 124 postgraduate courses, whilst the University of Staffordshire boasts two campus sites in Stoke-on-Trent and Stafford and is a UK and global leader in Creative Media, Digital and Computer Science disciplines, boasting state-of-the-art facilities.

We're also an excellent place to develop new skills, with over 13,000 Apprentices trained every year; and for those wanting to progress or change careers, over 5,000 MBA or post-graduate degrees are awarded every year. The new state-of-the-art JCB Academy provides bespoke learning for high school level students through to higher level degree apprenticeships.

The future looks even brighter too, with a new £28m NSCG Stafford campus now complete, £17m being invested in digital technology training hubs throughout the county and the £22.5M Stoke-on-Trent and Staffordshire Institute of Technology opening later this year.

It's the people in Staffordshire that make it unique. We are makers and creators, innovators and doers.

Long known for our resourcefulness, creativity and determination, we invented the modern toilet and the first dictionary, and made the county the home of brewing, Marmite and the iconic JCB yellow digger.

Today our success stories include developing advanced ceramics to put rovers onto Mars, electric vehicles and hydrogen technology. Our digital sector is on the rise too, with media buying, film, animation and VR businesses relocating to the county.

Here, you'll find plenty of employment opportunities; but Staffordshire is also the perfect place to start building your own empire.

There are around 400 start-up and scaling businesses across our 8 Enterprise Centres; Keele University also hosts eight innovation centres to support Staffordshire businesses including a Data Visualisation Suite, office space and hi-tech meeting and collaboration space, alongside a new veterinary school.

There's plenty of support for starting your own business too – in the past couple of years, over £3.4m has been allocated to 1,000 small and medium-sized businesses across Staffordshire, with £1.6 million of support for 400 new apprentices and £550,000-worth of free training for 2,500 employees.

Earnings here have been increasing faster than the national average over the last decade, and with a lower cost of living Staffordshire residents have an extra £1,342 disposable income per year compared to the wider West Midlands.

In Staffordshire, we don't just share your ambitions – we want to help you realise them. Whether you're looking to work, launch your own enterprise, invest or grow, we're here to ensure you prosper.

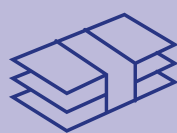

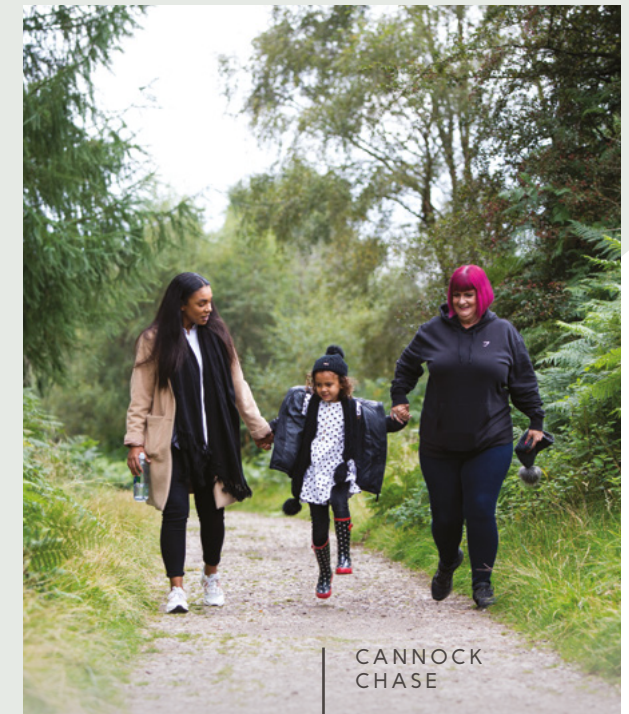
This is the rural heart of Staffordshire; a place with an outstanding natural environment, vibrant, close-knit communities and an adventurous spirit.

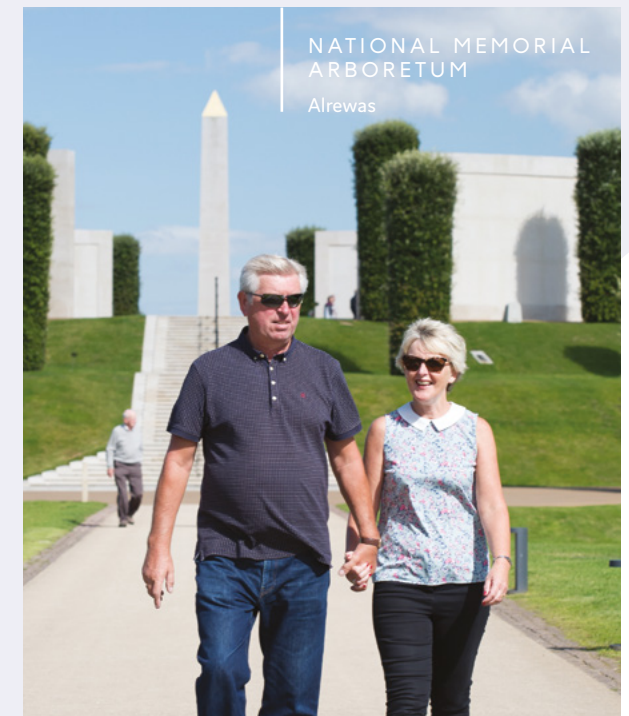
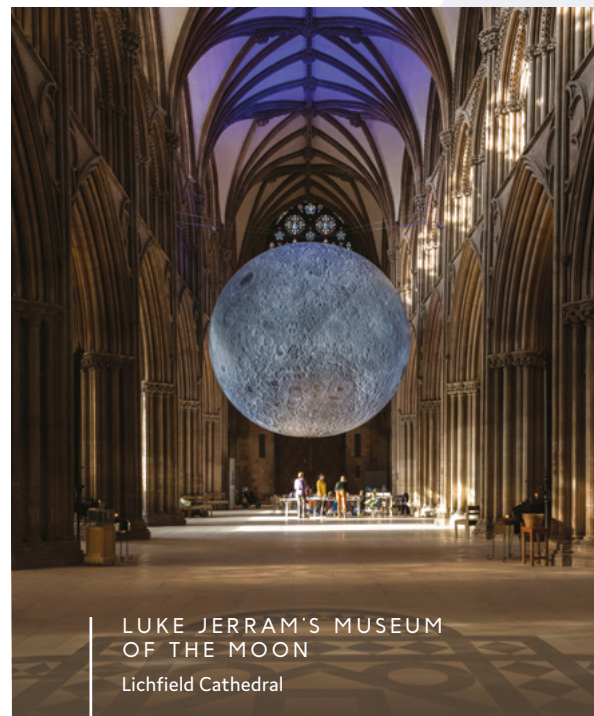

Beautiful countryside, pretty villages, award-winning restaurants and pubs – East Staffordshire has it all, and a lot more besides.

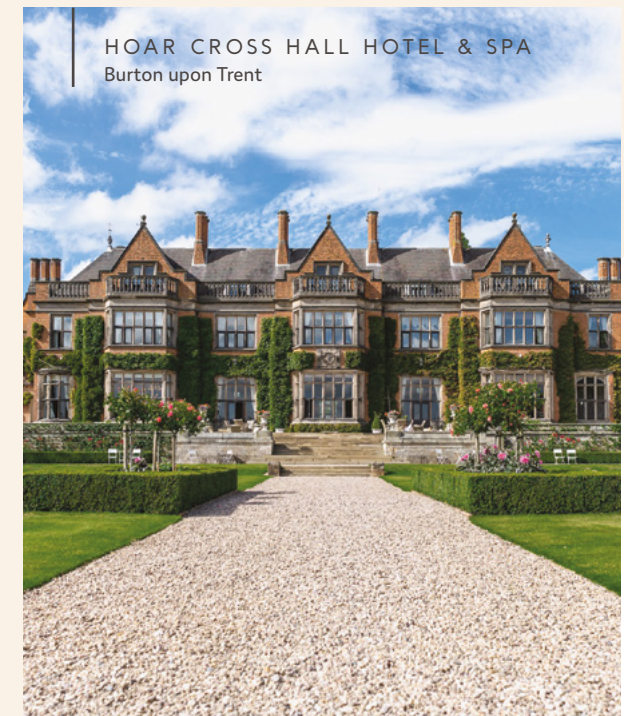
Among the village highlights are Tutbury, with its quaint shops and historic castle, Barton-under-Needwood with its annual teddy bear festival and beautiful Abbots Bromley; all are perfectly placed for picturesque walks, and for the area's two main towns – Burton upon Trent and Uttoxeter.

Uttoxeter is an attractive, friendly place, with its twice-weekly outdoor markets and a famous racecourse, close to Alton Towers and home to both St George's Park (England's National Football Centre) and the worldwide headquarters of JCB.

Burton upon Trent is known worldwide for its brewing prowess, but also home to many sports clubs (including rowing and sailing), as well as the natural beauty of the stunning Washlands.

In fact, the area's perfect for lovers of the great outdoors, with miles of stunning walks, cycle routes and canal towpaths to enjoy including the 75-mile National Forest Way, cycling trails like the Wychnor Cycle Route and more sedate nature at Branston Water Park nature reserve, Barton Marina or Stapenhill Gardens.

The borough is also packed with thriving businesses and attractions. From the renowned spa hotel at Hoar Cross Hall to the multi award-winning Meynell Ingram Arms and Denstone Hall Farm shop, or family time at the Adventure Farm to an evening of cultural entertainment at the Brewhouse, there really is something for the whole family to enjoy.

This historic market town is renowned as the home of Keele University which, together with Newcastle and Stafford Colleges Group (NSCG), has a strong academic reputation. The Keele University Science and Innovation Park is a regional centre of excellence, renowned for its research and innovation projects.

The award-winning New Vic Theatre is one of the country's most successful independent producing theatres, plus town centre events and festivals celebrating the area's cultural heritage – just one of the reasons Newcastle-under-Lyme is a great place to live, with a wide choice of housing from town centre apartments to rural family homes.

The borough is also in the midst of a massive programme of improvements, with over £50m of Government funding behind landmark projects such as the revitalisation of Newcastle and Kidsgrove town centres, and new developments in the urban villages of Knutton and Chesterton, plus executive family homes in Baldwins Gate.

Staffordshire is a real hub for creativity and has a thriving arts and culture scene. We've taken the theatre we make here to London's West End and to Broadway. We're so proud of the contribution we make to the rich, cultural offering of our area – filled with artists, makers and creative energy, it's a really wonderful place to live and work.

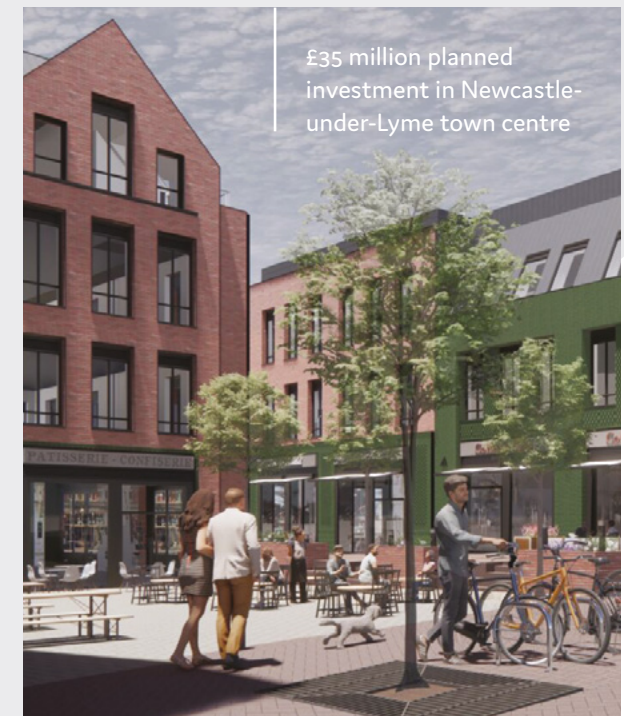

I've lived all over the country, but my spiritual home is here – it's a wonderful place to start a family with so much to do. I would recommend Staffordshire to anyone considering relocating.

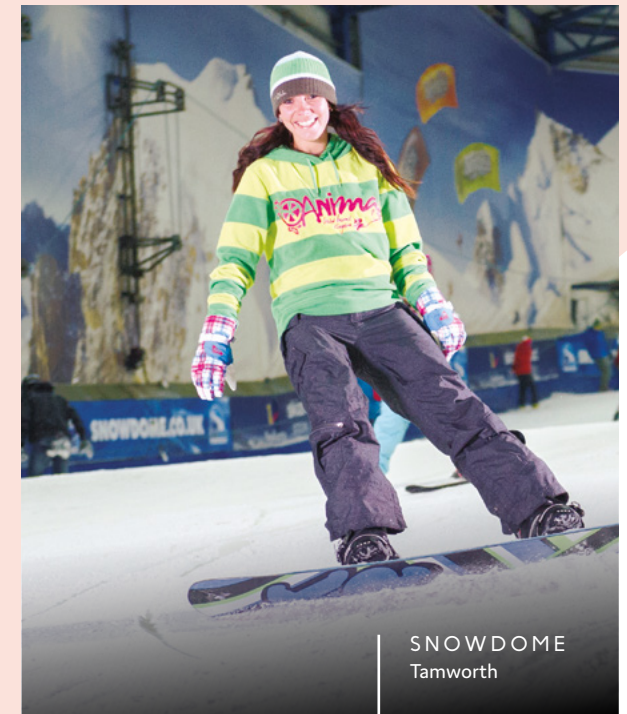
